

Neighborhood Planning Area Survey Results








BIG TAKEAWAYS

- Just over half of survey respondents were aware of the City's neighborhood planning areas (NPAs).
- Most respondents did not have a good sense of the physical boundaries of their NPAs.
- Survey respondents placed a lot of value on open space, scenic resources, and public facilities/amenities.
- Respondents were very concerned about homelessness, with divergent opinions on how to address it.
- Survey respondents want to see better maintenance of both public spaces and private property.
- Many respondents would like more retail and dining options (particularly those in the SLR Valley).
- Many respondents want to see more traffic calming and noise abatement.
- Many respondents were nostalgic about what Oceanside "used to be."
- While there were quite a few survey respondents who don't want to see any more development, many just want to see higher quality projects.
- Only a small percentage of respondents acknowledged the need for more housing, though some recognized the link between homelessness and the housing shortage.
- Few respondents seemed interested in expanding transit service, though some would like to see better access to transit stations and stops.
- A fair number of respondents placed high value on "access" to freeways and other auto-oriented conduits into and out of their neighborhoods and the City.
- Some survey respondents cautioned that placing too much emphasis on NPAs could foster parochialism, segregation, inequity, and an overly complicated decision-making process.




Question 1
In which neighborhood planning area (NAP) do you reside or own property?










